individuals. But the 407 Technical Review Committee did not agree, and we still have bugs to work out in relationship to this matter. And I think the compromise, in giving us a year to do that, will allow everyone to address a very broad and many-faceted area. And I think this next year will allow that. I think all of the people have come into this in a show of good faith. They need to work on this some more, and to work out a permanent but a responsive solution to the problem. And I would urge your adoption of the Wesely amendment and the moving of the bill. Thank you.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Hartnett, please.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Mr. Speaker, if I could ask Senator Wesely some questions.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Wesely, would you respond?

SENATOR WESELY: Sure.

SENATOR HARTNETT: What...Senator Wesely, this new category that you put, the special care provider, what training do they have to have, Senator Wesely? Is there any training?

SENATOR WESELY: Under this amendment?

SENATOR HARTNETT: Under this amendment, or do they need any...I could be a special care provider?

SENATOR WESELY: Yes. I mean you would have to prove your competence to handle the particular activity involved to a physician, and then the physician would oversee your...

SENATOR HARTNETT: Okay.

SENATOR WESELY: ...carrying out those. But, otherwise, no.

SENATOR HARTNETT: No special...okay. You know, there was an incident in the Omaha area, a couple...you know, dealing with special education. Does that have anything...does this bill have anything to do with that? I'm just...more for curiosity.

SENATOR WESELY: I don't know about that particular circumstance, but special education would be among the categories covered by this. We're dealing with routine physical
