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Secondly, we know that Governor Orr has for a long time taken a position of bringing "new blood" to these various positions, and that is her decision and she has every right to want to do that, and particularly if I am one of those who is on the outside, I would suppose I would support that kind of position. I have, in the past, frequently supported retention of experienced persons on these various boards, and I do not mean to the point of exclusivity, but simply for the purpose that it is important I believe to bring experience to these various entities. The discussion this morning relative to the NIFA board I believe points out the importance of having experience, having qualifications, and knowledge of the responsibility. The various appointments that are made to the various boards that are agriculture in nature I think are important that they have some background and some interest, most of all a dedication to do the job on behalf of the persons whom they are suppose to represent. I appreciate the fact that the lady who has been appointed seems to be very much dedicated to children, but I just want to say that, speaking I guess as a Republican, from time to time, believe it or not, as I travel across the State of Nebraska, I find that we are criticized and even once in awhile the Governor is criticized for our performance on behalf of the people, and perhaps it might just be that there is an impression, there is a perception that we do not bring to the various responsibilities the persons most qualified for the job. I want to say that having worked with Mr. Carlson, he was, as has been indicated here before, one of the persons intimately responsible for some of the early work relative to the investigation of the Franklin Federal Credit Union. I have maintained close rapport with Mr. Carlson, a member of that Foster Care Review Board, ever since, and have received good advice and counsel from them, and have gone back to them from time to time, particularly Mr. Carlson because of his background as an attorney, and he has never failed to give me whatever time that I needed. I, again, have to say that I can find no fault with the appointee. What my concern is, what the perception will be to the public, and there are already those who have contacted me who have said, why? Is there some ulterior motive? I don't think so. I don't think there is, but if it is perceived to be somehow or other an attempt to slow down the investigation, then that is all that really matters, that is all that really matters, because the public will think what they want to think. The Governor has made a decision and she is willing to live with it, and she is confident that she will be vindicated in her decision, and that is good enough I guess,
