Right now, though, in the Legislature, it is fashionable to see ulterior motives that we can tie into the Franklin Credit investigation, and I will say, again, we have to stop talking about Dennis Carlson in this regard because he is gone as far as this particular thing is concerned. I don't think that even if Alice Bartels is not confirmed that he will be appointed. Now I don't have any pipeline to the Governor's Office. I have not talked to the Governor's Office about this particular appointment. Nobody called me before the hearing before the Health and Human Services Committee. No one called me about this appointment. So going by what Alice Bartels said in her testimony and my impression of the woman, herself, I think she will bring something to that board that will be productive. Justice moves slowly in the United States of America. We are not a police state. That is the way it is supposed to be and it is frustrating sometimes because we know what is happening and it is difficult to get it altogether so the people who are the perpetrators of, for instance in this particular case, of abuse of children, which to us is the most heinous of crimes, but justice does move slowly and we have to allow it to go. And I understand the frustrations of everyone but Senator Wesely confuses me just a little this morning because I know normally he is very supportive of women but he is voting against women this morning, and it is for other reasons he says each time. But I reiterate what I said before, I think Alice Bartels is a very fine woman. One more thing about Dennis Carlson, and Bernice Labedz mentioned something that I had written down. Perhaps the Foster Care Review Board should figure out some way and the Legislature should help that board get some money to have a lawyer available and pay that person, and that way they wouldn't have to depend on a volunteer board member for those services. With the legislation that we have in place and the things we are trying to do to help that Foster Care Review Board function and so on, they need a lawyer. So I, for one, if we can figure out some way to help them pay for a lawyer, I certainly would vote for that money. I guess as long as it isn't anything over \$50,000, I am getting a little nervous on the floor these days about saying I will vote for this, that, and the other thing that has money attached to it. But to go back to my original premise, Alice Bartels is a very fine woman. I think she would bring something to the board that would be productive, and it would be very disappointing to me if this Legislature would reject her. She doesn't deserve that. Thank you.
