SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Repeat your last couple of sentences, I am sorry.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, that all railroad employees, all employees of this employer we are talking about shall be tested, how about that? Then we have covered them all as the railroads say they want. Let them all be covered by the federal standard. They all shall be covered, will you accept that? We are giving them what they say they want unless they lied to you which we don't believe they did, or do you?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I will have to consider that. I have to admit I am not sure. It would seem that if we were going to cover them under state law, then they ought to be covered under the federal law some way, that would seem logical to me.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, so if this amendment would exempt them from state law and that is what its purpose is, then shouldn't they be willing to accept an amendment to their amendment that would say all of their employees shall be, shall be covered by the federal and tested, so that it is not at their discretion to test the category covered by the federal regulation and leave those others untested altogether?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I think so. I would consider that. I would have to have I think an attorney advice on that for my own purposes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Which attorney? There is some attorneys in...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I am waiting for an attorney to speak on this.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, we will see what they say.
