

that are given are as valid there and as valid as they are here and perhaps would carry the day. But it seems to me that since students are not prohibited from appointment, certainly the right that they now have with the Board of Regents is limited by the Constitution which was a nonvoting member when it was adopted in the seventies and no one can do anything about that unless it's changed. But with no prohibition for a student, I see no reason to argue that students are being excluded. The issue is whether it should be reserved for a position. I am willing to see that be placed on the ballot, where in the past I would have opposed it. But I would hope you would adopt this amendment so that the structural change can be addressed and then the broader scope as envisioned with this particular thing could also be dealt separately. I hope the body would adopt the amendment to the committee amendment.
