

moving to the Attorney General, page 66, Section 30 of the committee amendments, provides an additional \$80,000 in '90-91 for rent at the Nebraska State Education Association Building where the majority of the employees in the office work. It was assumed last year that this money would be unnecessary because the offices would be moved to the Capitol tower in fiscal year '90-91. However, that space will not be available in '90-91, so the payment of the rent at the NSEA Building needs to be continued for another year. There is also an additional \$40,000 allocated both years for legal expenses. These expenses have already exceeded the budget amount by about \$30,000 for the current fiscal year. This bill also adds \$6,000 in the current fiscal year for the cost of moving six employees into space in the State Office Building. The money was spent to provide a modest legal library and necessary office supplies for the space. State colleges, Agency 49, amount of \$15,000 for legal fees incurred relative to 247 opinion and legal work. The board retained legal counsel to research the constitutional issues, prepare a legal memorandum, outline the issues to be considered, to confer with the Attorney General and to file an amicus curiae, friend to the court, brief in the Supreme Court case related to LB 247. The board incurred \$15,881 in legal expenses in addressing the constitutionality of LB 247. Item number 2 is an additional allocation to the Nebraska Humanities Council in the amount of \$75,000 each year. This amendment provides that amount and requires a two to one matching source from private funds in order to allocate these funds. In other words, \$75,000 here is, there must be half that amount, up to the \$75,000 as allocated here, up to half that amount must be raised by private sources. So it is a two for one match up to the \$75,000 maximum. The Humanities Council will be using this money in three different forms, one in the operation of the Humanities Resource Center, the Chautauqua programs and the Grants for Humanities programs across the state. State colleges, Agency 50, first one is Chadron State. There is an allocation of \$25,000 for a technical staff position at Chadron State, specifically for an MBA program to assist with a satellite delivery of a two-tiered MBA program in conjunction with the University of Nebraska, Lincoln which will be delivered via satellite to Scottsbluff by both Chadron State and UN-L. It's just one component of the Governor's recommended funding for Phase II of the NEB*SAT plan. Item number 2 is Chadron State Rural Health Opportunities Program. It is a program you've probably read about with Chadron State entering in agreements with the University of Nebraska Medical Center which includes
