Again, I would encourage the adoption of this amendment today. Thank you.

Thank you for visiting us today. Senator Moore, please, followed by Senator Schmit and Senator Hannibal.

SENATOR MOORE: Yes, Mr. President and members, if Senator Coordsen would yield to a question.

PRESIDENT: Senator Coordsen, please.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Yes, Senator Moore.

SENATOR MOORE: Senator Coordsen, you said in your opening today that if we do not appropriate this money there will be services terminated. Is that what you said?

SENATOR COORDSEN: It is my understanding that there will be people whose services will be in jeopardy, yes.

SENATOR MOORE: No, the question was, will people presently being served have their services terminated if we don't appropriate this money? Do you have the answer to that?

SENATOR COORDSEN: No, I don't have the answer to that. We can find that answer.
