CLERK: (Roll call vote commenced.)

PRESIDENT: (Gavel.) Ladies and gentlemen, please hold it down, the Clerk can't hear your response. Thank you.

CLERK: (Finished with roll call vote. See pages 1339-40 of the Legislative Journal.) 22 ayes, 12 nays, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The amendment fails. Do you have any more, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Yes, sir, I do.

PRESIDENT: The call is raised.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next amendment to the committee amendments is by Senator Korshoj. (Korshoj amendment appears on pages 1340-41 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT: Senator Korshoj, please.

SENATOR KORSHOJ: Mr. President and members, my amendment is for the Student Tuition Assistance Program. We just passed you out a copy of what it actually does, and that information that we've given you comes from the Nebraska Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary Education. It does nothing to the formula which we have fought over the last two years. It helps all students in postsecondary education, and it...the money is available only for financially needy students.
