not recall, I suppose there may have been one or two, but I simply do not recall any request that was ever made that did not have merit. Certainly, it had merit in someone's eyes. And so there is no way to argue for or against any expenditure on the basis of merit. The issue always come down to how much we have available. As things now stand, if you look on the back of the green sheet, why there is...this is one-time money, by the way, as opposed to an ongoing program, so you do have a sum of funds that are available for one-time program or one-time expenditure this year and there are a number of other competing items as well for one-time money, collectively it adds up to more than we have, or if you split it up to how much it reduces one-time money, reduces what would be available for an ongoing program, that's another way to do it. So I just simply call your attention to the fact that it's not a whole lot different here than it is at home, when the money's gone, the money's gone, and then you stop. And I suspect what the process will be is, as has been the process in the last few years, is that the stop never occurs till it gets to the Governor's desk and then there is a series of vetoes which we will all be thankful for the total dollar amount that was vetoed and bitterly complain about the itemized list of vetoes as it was the wrong thing, but nevertheless it's a judgment each of you have to make as to whether ... at what point you want to stop. That's all I can say. I do know you will stop when the money's gone. The Constitution is fairly plain that way. But there's room for this, obviously, and there won't be room for something else and those are judgments that each of you need to make individually.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. Senator Coordsen, your light is still on, would you care to...thank you. There are no other lights on at the present time, Senator Beyer, would you care to close on your motion to reconsider?

SENATOR BEYER: Well, Mr. Speaker and colleagues, as has been said by several of them before, this is important to the agricultural industry of Nebraska. It's probably something that needs to be looked at and I would appreciate the fact that you would support this. Senator Coordsen would like to finish. Thank you.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Coordsen, please.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Thank you, Senator Beyers. Beyer. Beyer. Senator Warner is right, there is only
