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which when they come to their priorities through other pieces of legislation then you vote no on that. And so I just...simple thing, I think people should look at how they vote on both sides of that issue and then come to their own realization on what is the priorities, their own priorities, and how can they best come with...if it's on the floor of the Legislature, it's one way to get your priorities across, the other way is to work through the process and you get your priorities across. So vote as you wish.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. Senator Lamb.

SENATOR LAMB: Well, Mr. President, I just am forced to respond to my young friend, Senator Moore. One time he was referred to on this floor as sounding like Howard Lamb, Jr. That has long gone down the drain. But, you know, I think these are two separate issues. I'm not...I don't agree with everything that the Regents do or the state colleges or the community technical colleges, but we should not mix these two issues. I am sure if the new restructuring system goes into effect that Senator Moore will not agree with everything that this new Board of Regents comes forth with. In fact, I would be very disappointed in him if he did because he is a very independent young man, uses his own independent judgment. Unfortunately, once in a while he's wrong.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Lynch.

SENATOR LYNCH: Yeah, I...Mr. Speaker and members, could I ask, I guess, Senator Coordsen a question?

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Coordsen, please.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Certainly.

SENATOR LYNCH: I understand that this roof repair was not in one of the requests by the university. Is that right or wrong? Do you know?

SENATOR COORDSEN: On the total renovation of the greenhouses, I believe, it was number 14 on the list and it has been at that point in time.

SENATOR LYNCH: Okay, so it was a request but down the list.
