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is to ask them to do as good a job in that field as they are doing in the other fields. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR HANNIBAL: Thank you, Senator Haberman. Senator Morrissey, please.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: I will just wait and close, thank you.

SENATOR HANNIBAL: Thank you. Senator Haberman, your own light is on now, would you care to speak? Senator Haberman passes. Senator Byars, please. The question has been called. The question before you is, shall debate cease? Do I see five hands. I do. The question is, shall debate cease? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Shall debate cease, have you all voted? Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 1 nay to cease debate, Mr. President.

SENATOR HANNIBAL: Debate has ceased. Senator Morrissey, would you care to close on your amendment?

SENATOR MORRISSEY: Thank you, Mr. President, and members. Senator Warner had his no button up, would you like a minute, Senator Warner, of my closing? I am kind of brief on it.

SENATOR HANNIBAL: Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Well, I am not sure you want me to. I am in support of it, however, but as the tone went that the Revenue Department wasn't doing its job kind of bothered me and Senator Haberman has certainly pointed out where it has. What intrigues me here is not that we are putting on some more auditors, it provides funds to contract with another state. I know we have cooperative agreements between the two states, but, in this case, why would another state send an auditor in to provide information to collect Nebraska taxes? It makes no sense that they would do that, but if you pay them to do it, if you offer a contract that we will help pay the auditing that they would normally be doing, that makes sense to me, and that is all I look upon this as authorizing it to be done, so thank you, Senator Morrissey.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: That was the first thing I wanted to make clear. This cooperative agreement, sometimes known as a compact, is not working. They don't want...it is going to cost
