used in Nebraska.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What constitutes an antique when we deal with a tractor, Senator Moore?

SENATOR MOORE: You'll have to ask Senator Schellpeper that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But how are you going to tell us the criteria are the same in these few little basic questions? I want to ask you a couple more and then I will go to Senator Schellpeper and he can be organizing his thoughts because I will put the same questions to him. These tractors are not going to go away, are they? They will not deteriorate in the same way that a painting or an artistic...

SENATOR MOORE: Well, the reason for the amendment is to build a door so there's a building to put them in. If they were not inside, they would definitely deteriorate and be of less value than they would be if they were inside. So, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What are they of value for? What is the value of them?

SENATOR MOORE: Senator Schellpeper may know the answer to that question, I do not.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, are you going to support Senator Schellpeper's amendment?

SENATOR MOORE: Five thousand dollars? No, I will not.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Sit down. I thought I had...Senator Schellpeper, would you answer a couple of questions for me?

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Be glad to.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What makes a tractor an antique?

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: I think the classification, Senator Chambers, is any tractor over 30 years old.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So then it's just old...if...if it was somebody, such as myself, who doesn't have this definition, it would just be junk.
