SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, if they're attending, you mean, so you just want attendance record.

SENATOR COORDSEN: So...whether they have...whether they're attending, whether they are doing the classes, whatever that particular type of program that they're enrolled in requires of them to do.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: All right, let's say that you get a report...let's forget any difficulties in obtaining this information in the issue Senator Chizek raised so that I can try to get a hypothetical before us. The Commissioner of Labor, who is not a doctor, who is not a psychiatrist, which is a medical doctor first and then branches off into psychiatry but has not medical training receives a report like this, Jerry Chizek attends the program but he always has a frown on his face. He is sullen. He is unhappy. He makes other people unhappy by his attitude. Now what does the commissioner do with a report like that? Is that satisfactory attendance and participation?
