They do it because they're intelligent people, they understand what needs to be done and they do it because there's business and money to be made. This is such a ridiculously small thing that Senator Wehrbein is trying to have exempted. It is so ridiculously small that when they do a test on probable cause, when the test results come back, members of the body, all they have to do with the bill we pass is look at the chart and see whether or not the test results meet the chart.

SPEAKER BARRETT: One minute.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: A fifth grader could do it. I think my six-year-old could do it because he can look at numbers and he knows which one is smaller or less than. And the railroads are saying that's too complicated. If the Wehrbein amendment is defeated, all we will have is an equal due process within this state where if probable cause exists, they will do a test, that will not change, the test results will come back and they will compare it to the standards and that's it. I hope the Wehrbein amendment is not agreed to. Thank you.
