first time that I can remember since I have been in the body, I am going to bite my lip and not pursue the direction that I really want to pursue, because if I did so, I'd begin asking questions of Senator Langford why the ideal of peace, why that might be a problem on a panel. Or the Scourge of Poverty, she talks about, where I read recognition of heroic service to society and devotion to humanity of those who provide relief for the poor and oppressed in our society; food for the hungry and hospitality for the homeless, some of the Christian things that are within our morals of society that Senator Langford apparently is opposed to. But I am not going to do that at this point. I am not going to embarrass the body by going much further on this, so I respectfully just give the rest of my time back to the Chair.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. Senator Hall.

SENATOR HALL: Mr. President, I would give my time to Senator Langford to respond, if she wishes, otherwise keep it.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Langford, would you like some time?

SENATOR LANGFORD: I am sorry, Mr. President, I would have to have a repeat. I was talking to Senator Wehrbein and I did not hear what was said.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Hall yielded some of his time to you, if you would like to respond to anything.

SENATOR LANGFORD: I didn't hear it. I am sorry.

SENATOR HALL: No, I thought you possibly wanted to respond to Senator Bernard-Stevens. I can understand if you wouldn't but...

SENATOR LANGFORD: No, I did not hear what he said. I am sorry. If I am insulted, I am insulted.

SENATOR HALL: Oh, I don't think that was the case. I was just curious as well. Thank you.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman, and members of the Legislature, I have never been one to glorify war. Wars are
