graduate students and one of the graduate students that she works with, 23 percent of undergraduate women reported being sexually abused as children and 36 percent reported attempted rape by a date, 12 percent by students reporting being victims of date rape by force. In other words, sexual abuse is not uncommon and that can be the breeding ground for this violence. Why would I, in the face of 19,000 signatures, in the face of the anger of my colleagues rise to oppose this measure?

SPEAKER BARRETT: Time.

SENATOR LANDIS: I'll be happy to tell you on my next amendment.

SPEAKER BARRETT: The question is the Landis motion to return LB 688E to Select File for the purpose of an amendment. All in favor of that motion vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? A record vote has been requested. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: (Read record vote. See pages 1751-52 of the Legislative Journal.) 3 ayes, 24 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to return.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Motion fails. The next amendment, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, I have a priority motion. Senator Chambers would move to reconsider the vote to...just taken with respect to Senator Landis's motion to return the bill.

SPEAKER BARRETT: The Chair recognizes Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, Senator Lindsay, you're absolutely correct and I don't make any bones about what my intention is. I'm not going to disguise it or masquerade it as something other than what it is. I mentioned it to Senator Labedz and I'm sure even if I hadn't mentioned it, what I'm about to attempt is no surprise to her. I think it's necessary that some information get into the record on this overall subject that has not so far, to show how extreme the conduct can be that will be taken toward and against those who disagree with those who think that a woman should have no right to an abortion. I have an article here dated December 5, 1989, from USA TODAY. It's their cover story and the headline is, "Abortion splits church, candidate." It's datelined San Diego and it reads as follows: "California Assemblywoman, Lucy Killea still goes to Mass each week, but when other parishioners
