

here, but I'm not blaming them for that, blame is not the word that I would use. I'd say that it wouldn't make sense, in my opinion, for people on your side to stand up and say, this that is happening should not occur. There are people who are not members of the Legislature who warned us that they were going to do this on your side. A lady, L-o-s-t-r-o-h or something like that, I don't know how to pronounce her name had said that you guys are tired. They're tired, they out there in the lobby are tired of playing. They're going to take the gloves off and play hard ball or bare knuckles or something, yet they're not in here to vote, but they can send their orders in and if these are the orders they send in and they're to be followed, I'm not going to roll over and accept it. They can come bare headed, bare knuckled, bare anything they want to and this is going to continue as it's going now and I'm prepared to get into the record a goodly amount of necessary information so that anybody in the future who wants to review what we discussed and how we got to the point that we ultimately will arrive at before this session is over or when this session ends will understand full well how we got there and the kinds of issues that were before us. Had the Chair not ruled to cease debate, that motion that was before us when he did so rule, would have been discussed by now. So what we're doing is going to continue and those who call the question play into my hands. I don't mind discussing the issue on motions to reconsider or on other types of motions, literally hundreds of which are available to be made. Now, we can divide each legislative day remaining into 12 hours because I doubt that we'll stay here much longer than that, or let's say we'll start at eight and go to midnight. So from eight to eight is 12, four additional hours makes 16. If there are five legislative days during which we can work 16 hours a day, that's only 80 hours. I mean, that's only 80 hours altogether. And anybody who has convictions on an issue who cannot discuss that issue for 80 hours is not sincere, is not genuine. So, I think we have to be prepared to take this very divisive issue, this gut-wrenching issue and just wrench some guts. This is one time, Senator Lamb, when I'm not going to get angry at anybody. This is the time to enlighten the public. Senator Hall thinks he can make me angry, but having warned me, I'm forearmed, he can't do it.

PRESIDENT: One minute.
