PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: And what I think I am doing, what I am doing I think is morally right. We can't change each other's minds and we can't change each other's hearts, but then they started calling me spineless and gutless for not changing my mind, basically, for disagreeing with them, and I think we need to do whatever we can to prevent things from happening, things that are bad, and where I was almost ready to cave in, something happened, and I am not going to now. There are things bad that can happen with the parental notification, and you can't deny it. You can only say, I don't care about those people that are going to get hurt, I care about these people, and I have a hard time doing that little juggling act.

PRESIDENT: Time. Thank you. Senator Schimek, please, followed by Senator Bernard-Stevens, Senator Chambers, and Senator Hall.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Mr. President, and members of the body. Senator Lamb, I am not sure why you are feeling so defensive today but my remarks towards Senator Labeledz and Senator Lindsay were not meant to assess blame. If I conveyed that impression, then I must learn to be more precise. The real intent of my remarks were to prod this body to reconsider what we are doing here today and, possibly, on Monday and Tuesday, and Wednesday, and Thursday of next week. I am concerned that we are simply spinning our wheels and I think Senator Landis, in his questions of you and of this body, further illuminated this point by mentioning that, indeed, we are attempting to pass a bill which is already on the books, which has already been declared unconstitutional, and if, indeed, the higher courts say that it is constitutional, then we do already have that law on
