PRESIDENT: Senator Labedz, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR LABEDZ: A point of personal privilege.

PRESIDENT: State your point, please.

SENATOR LABEDZ: On Senator Landis, we are up to about five.

PRESIDENT: Senator Landis, you and I are in trouble, too.

SENATOR LANDIS: Okay, ...

PRESIDENT: I am awfully sorry.

SENATOR LANDIS: When the moment comes, I will close on that case.

PRESIDENT: Okay.

SENATOR LANDIS: When the moment comes.

PRESIDENT: All right, thank you. Would you please check to see about Senator Ashford before we let him start. And Senator Chambers follows him. Just a minute, we are checking to see how many times you have spoken. Well, it is not the content of what you talked about, it is the number of times we are interested in. Senator Ashford, you may speak. You have only spoken once on this, one time.

SENATOR ASHFORD: Oh, thank you.

PRESIDENT: Okay, thank you.

SENATOR ASHFORD: Thank you. Are there any other lights on, Mr. President?

PRESIDENT: Yes, three others.

SENATOR ASHFORD: Three others, I don't know who to get on. See, I have covered Senator Chizek's grandchild. I have covered...were you here when I talked about the guns. No more guns, no more guns. All right, I guess I will give the rest of my time to Senator Chambers.
