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intelligent thing would be to accept the procedure, but if it is serious enough, a person goes there with fear and trepidation anyway. So to add to that, a trauma required by law is something that we should not do. LB 769 is the beginning of a very bad...

PRESIDENT: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ... complex of issues.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. You used all of Senator Ashford's time, so we will go to Senator Nelson, please, followed by Senator Weihing and Senator Elmer. Senator Nelson.

SENATOR NELSON: I will forego mine unless Senator Schimek wants it and I don't think she does. Senator...

PRESIDENT: What's his name.

SENATOR NELSON: Senator Chambers, do you want some more time?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

PRESIDENT: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, Mr. Chairman, and members of the Legislature, as many times as I have spoken, it would seem that my name would be known, even if it were not known before today. But I want to continue discussing this, not because they are lobbying in the aisles and things like that, but I want to continue getting things into the record, and I have an item here which contains some information.

SENATOR LABEDZ: Mr. President, point of personal privilege.

PRESIDENT: Senator Labedz.

SENATOR LABEDZ: I checked with the Assistant Clerk and Senator Nelson has already spoke three times, so she has no time to give to Senator Chambers.

PRESIDENT: Is that true, Miss Vicky. Yes, she says, yes, so Senator Chambers, you can't have it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman.
