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information to be given. We could give more assistance for prenatal care to help poor women who become pregnant and may feel that abortion is the only alternative because they don't have the means to protect their health or take care of a child once it comes into the world. And we've had many opportunities to enact such legislation, and the Legislature steadfastly has refused.

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So, theoretically speaking, those are some of the things we could do. But, realistically speaking, based on the record of the Legislature, those things will not be done,...

SENATOR ELMER: I might have another...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...in my opinion.

SENATOR ELMER: I might have another question, too, Senator Chambers. We've all been talking about the less than 18-year-old young woman who is unmarried, that may be involved in asking for or giving her per...notifying her parent. How many of these less than 18-year-old unmarried young women, who find themselves in this kind of a situation, would be from what you would call a dysfunctional family where she might suffer abuse?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I don't know, because dysfunctional to me would not necessarily be determined by socioeconomic status. It's just a family that is not operating the way it should, where there is not the concern for the youngster, and there could be the serious problems that you mentioned in part of your questions. I have no way of knowing.

PRESIDENT: Time.

SENATOR ELMER: These...Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Abboud, please, followed by Senator Labeledz. I don't see Senator Abboud. Senator Labeledz, would you like to continue, please. You're next speaker, Senator Labeledz. Okay, Senator Crosby, please.
