

those who are for abortion, as though it's just hanging out there in the air some place, are for murder. Well, Governor Cuomo is a Catholic and he was called a man with a pro-death stance, because he believes in a woman's right to make a choice. We're arguing in the sense that kids understand the term. We have contrary opinions, and we state our opinions over and over, as loudly as we can, as strongly as we can, as often as we can, to try to wear the other person down. And there is some evidence of wearing down in this discussion. However, there are motions under the rules that can be made which will prevent any schemes that may have been hatched in the aisles or in the corridors, or wherever else. And I intend to deliver on the promise that I made, because if I don't, then I am the one who will have shown to be faithless, who will talk about the principles involved. Then at the first sign of real adversity, I will forsake those principles and flee. I cannot do that. I don't know what it is that happened to some of the other senators, but I can speculate about it. I can do that, but I won't. On these types of issues, as with abortion, each person has a conscience with which to deal. Senator Landis indicated that a judgment will be made by some power greater than he as to the propriety of a woman having an abortion. And as long as there is somebody up in the sky, not riding in an airplane or any artificial means, I don't mind that judgment being made either. Because between Senator Landis and me, if there were any force making such judgments, it seems to me that some of those judgments would have been on behalf of those who do, indeed, need help in this world. If you go to any large city, you may find many cathedrals, many chapels, many mosques, many churches, many synagogues. Also, you'll find many people who are homeless and who are hungry. Senator Lynch has had a couple of amendments in here, or propositions, to provide money in the budget bill to help some of those groups. On one of the amendments we were not successful, maybe on none of them. But there was one in particular that sticks in my mind, because it was designed to make services available to people who need them the most. Not long ago in Omaha a young man was taken to
