There was a guy in a loony bin who wrote the president a letter and said that he should die. And the FBI went and picked up that man from the loony bin and took him before a federal judge and he was charged with making a threat against the president and processed as though that man would have been in a position to carry out the words he uttered to the point of actually taking the president's life. Those words have been made a crime in this country. These words, if added to this bill, would indicate that those whose job it is to counsel and discuss various important issues with people are prohibited from talking about things related to contraception. Now, what is contraception? What does contra mean? If you pronounce it contra, then you're talking about what Ronald Reagan was. He said he was one of those too, even though he couldn't pronounce it.
