SENATOR DIERKS: Yesterday or maybe the day before, you were talking in here about a couple candidates from Texas were running for governor. And one of them said, well, if you elect me governor, I'll kill all those guys on death row, and the other one said, I already killed them all.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mmmm, hmmm.

SENATOR DIERKS: Then you said, and your statement was this, what kind of an argument is that in a humane society?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right.

SENATOR DIERKS: You did say that. The other thing you said, talking about drug problems in the schools of this state, we were talking about Senator Pirsch's bill yesterday, you said, evil will triumph when good men and women do nothing.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right.

SENATOR DIERKS: And I presume that I am still looking for those statesmen who will stand up and do something to prevent evil from occurring. Thank you.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Mr. Clerk, you have a motion on the desk.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Chambers would move to bracket the bill until January 2, 1991.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Chambers, on the motion to bracket.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, Mr. Chairman, having spoken three times on the other matter, there is no way that I could speak within the rules, and it's clear we're now going to discuss the issues that are involved in this bill no matter what the motion is, and I could not sit there without being able to speak and I'm sure my colleagues have grown weary of me asking them to turn on their light and share some time with me. Senator Dierks has gotten into the discussion, and I'm glad that he has. As a matter of fact, I may have helped kind of instigate his entry into the discussion. I disagree with Senator Dierks on this question probably as much as anybody could disagree with another person, but disagreement does not mean that the person with whom you disagree has nothing to contribute. Since we're trying to get all points of view into this record, I'm glad Senator Dierks
