The first reason is no one ever changes their mind on this issue. Usually once people decide this issue, because it is so emotional and it is such a matter of personal intent, you don't...logic doesn't apply to this particular issue, and if you haven't been reasoned into a position, you can't be reasoned out of it, and on abortion, people decided based upon their emotion, based upon their past bias, their prejudice, or what have you. So there really isn't any purpose in debating the issue to try to change minds here in the Legislature. I doubt that few will change. The second reason is that I don't think we need to take additional time. And really if you want to hear the other side, I would encourage you to core to the conference tomorrow that the pro-life people are having in Lincoln...

SPEAKER BARRETT: Time.

SENATOR McFARLAND: ...because they have a lot of things to say that will give the other side and their reasons for their position. And I congratulate everyone for staying here to see this battle out. Thank you.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. Senator Abboud, followed by Senator Wesely.

SENATOR ABBOUD: Question.

SPEAKER BARRETT: I am sorry.

SENATOR ABBOUD: I call the previous...
