

PRESIDENT: Senator Warner, please.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, this amendment was suggested by E & R. It's not a substantive change as the policy. It was to clarify the ballot language so that, as you will recall, there are two effective...or two proposals that would be on the ballot, one dealing with the student voting member of the Board of Trustees as well as the other portion, and this is the...they proposed, E & R suggested the language in order to make it clarified that in the event one of those amendments was adopted and the other one wasn't, that the effective dates would be appropriate for either eventuality. It is not meant to be substantive in any manner.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator McFarland, please, on the Warner amendment. Okay. Senator Warner, did you wish to close? The question is the adoption of the Warner amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. We're voting on the adoption of Senator Warner's amendment. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of Senator Warner's amendment.

PRESIDENT: The Warner amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator McFarland would move to amend. Senator, I now have 3178 in front of me.

PRESIDENT: Senator McFarland, please.

CLERK: It's on page 1627, Senator.

SENATOR MCFARLAND: I'd withdraw that, Mr. Clerk.

PRESIDENT: It is withdrawn.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next amendment I have to the resolution is by Senator McFarland, 3197, Senator.

PRESIDENT: Senator McFarland.

SENATOR MCFARLAND: Thank you. I will discuss this one. This amendment is 3197, found at page 1646 of the Journal. It is a fairly simple amendment, one that had been proposed and
