

SENATOR LAMB: Raise the call.

CLERK: ...Senator Chambers would move to amend. Senator, I have your amendment that reads, page 5, line 20, after the word "government", strike all language through the word "vote" on line 24.

SENATOR LAMB: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman, there was another version of that amendment that was to be left on the desk. If it wasn't, I'm going to bring a copy that I may have on my desk here because I had asked that it be left there. Oh, okay.

CLERK: I have another amendment from you up here, Senator. I don't know if it's...it's similar. It starts, page 5, line 10, following the word "a", insert the word "voting"? (See Chambers amendment FA449 as found on pages 1798-99 in the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes. Now, I should have indicated that is to replace the one I had because there are other places that must be dealt with which the first one did not, so I'm going to ask that that first one be withdrawn.

CLERK: So, Senator, this is the amendment that reads: on page 5, line 10, following the word "a", insert the word "voting"; in line 20, following the period, strike all language through the word "vote" in line 24; page 7, strike lines 19 through 24; page 8, strike line 1.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, and, Mr. Clerk, I'm glad you read it just the way you did, but in the first, in number one, it's page 5, line 18.

CLERK: Line 18.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I had read it as 10 also.

CLERK: Yes, sir.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But it is 18, and if you look at it you can see...
