Governor's party, then what difference would it make if somebody changed his or her party affiliation to be one of the other, you know the others that would have to be there for balance in order to be appointed? They would still be a member of the Governor's party but there would be a little work the person would have to go through to achieve that.

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR WARNER: I guess the answer is that is my whole point, it doesn't mean anything.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But...

SENATOR WARNER: It could very easily be just a sham that we got half of or no more than half of one political party when, in fact, that may not be the real case at all.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So then, really, by the same token, nothing would be harmed if we would put that in, would it, if we are going to have it in the first instance?

SENATOR WARNER: Only, then it would be, from a historical point of view, it would be the first time, at least, that I am aware of that in these kind of areas we have inserted a partisan issue in educational issues.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Have we ever had an appointed member of the Board of Regents, appointed by the Governor, before this particular provision?

SENATOR WARNER: For a vacancy, yes, but not...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, I meant like we are doing here.

SENATOR WARNER: No, but there was vacancies that have been appointed by Governors.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: My time is up, Mr. Chairman, my time is up?

PRESIDENT: Four seconds, three seconds.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you.

PRESIDENT: It is all gone. Thank you. Senator Schimek, would
