PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Lynch, please, followed by Senator Schimek and Senator Schmit.

SENATOR LYNCH: Mr. President, members, you know this is a hell of a way to do business, obviously, but I'm going to support it, because it isn't any more silly, stupid, irreverent, illegal, immoral than what the exercise has been that we've experienced in the last few days. I think it's important for us to understand that the rules are there to provide us the opportunity to understand what we do, and even in some cases, even though I don't think that was the intention of the rules, to prevent things from happening. I think if we feel strongly about that, the rules are there and obviously they're used for that purpose. I think most people know that I got in trouble with some people who were right to life because of amendments I offered on the parent notification bill. I still feel strongly about that. However, I do want you to know I have no pet bills that are still out there waiting for action to be taken, and I don't intend to teach anybody any lessons about how the rules should apply, or how they should work, or how they should fit. And I don't intend to threaten anybody about anything, and I certainly don't want to leave the impression I'm going to try to teach Ernie anything, because Ernie knows everything, I guess, or more than most of us. And most of us...and I admit to that. But I don't think we should take pride in that necessarily at all. We shouldn't flaunt the fact that we can use the rules, in my opinion, for the wrong purposes. I don't like this at all. I think this stinks, but I'm going to support it because I think probably even more so, and if you're a plumber you know what stink is, believe me. What we've been going through the last few days probably smells worse. So, as far as I'm concerned, I hope we do get the 30 votes to suspend the rules to do this. Even though we may be on only second base, we have to give people a chance to discuss meaningfully, not read from papers and documents just to waste time, that mean very little, repeat things over and over and over again, that's nothing for any of us to be proud of, and it's nothing that any of us should do. I got hell over the weekend from constituents because some of them said, well as Chairman of the Rules, why don't you do something
