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between the cracks, Senator Moore. He was in the newspapers prior to your birth, and he wasn't dead long enough to be in the history books. And so you should check with Senator LaVon Crosby and myself, who were young Republicans before you were born, and we could bring you up-to-date on some of those people. That makes about as much sense as any of the rest of the remarks that have been made here this morning. And it's always of interest, of course, when we stand up here and flagellate ourselves these last days and deplore our conduct. I just want to say one more time that this might be one of the best things that happens as far as the people of Nebraska are concerned that some of these bills do not get read. I want to say again that time after time on this floor I have deplored the lack of debate on major bills, bills that should have been debated, bills that should never have been on consent file, bills that were not fully understood, bills that moved with a minimum of debate, a minimum of discussion, and a minimum of understanding. Time, after time, after time on this floor we hear the comment it was never intended, it was never intended that we do this, it was never intended that there be a tax increase, it was never intended by the Legislature that this would happen or that would happen. Ladies and gentlemen, as I've said before on this body, nothing ever happens suddenly, we just only discover it suddenly. We've suddenly discovered we are in the final days of the session and many of our favorite bills are doomed to failure. Well, I would suggest that this morning well intended attempts to expedite the session is probably going to bog the session down even further. And that is probably not all bad. I want to say also, though, that we need not criticize anyone for using the rules. The rules are there, we've used them before, we're going to use them again. Any one of us will use them when they serve our purpose. Had I been the one to make the motion, as I said, I would have preferred to have gone all the way to Final Reading. I don't like to jump halfway across a lake, particularly when the lake is filled with alligators, and that's exactly what's going to happen. If we get to that Select File, the alligators are going to just eat us up anyway. And so I would have preferred to have gone the entire distance. I think, however, that we talk about the importance of various bills. Senator Dierks considers two bills very important, 1151 and 858, I believe. I think that one of them is very important. I think the other one is of secondary importance. But it would be nice to vote on those bills up or down and take our chances. It's amazing to me on this floor what sometimes is deemed to be extremely important. That's our own priorities. Sometimes I
