compromises work on this floor. Usually the compromises are brought about when you don't have the votes to get the job done. If you have the votes, sometimes you do not need to compromise, and on the other hand, there are times when even a minority can thwart the will of the majority through use of the rules. That is the system. We live by it. We work by it, and sometimes bills die because of it. Senator Labedz has offered a motion. It is the exact motion that you will have this afternoon on Final Reading. I support the motion because I think it is a step toward the possibility that certain bills might be voted upon on Final Reading that will not take place otherwise. I ask you to do the same.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. The question is, shall the agenda be overruled? All those...roll call vote has been requested and reverse order has been requested, and that will be granted. A call of the house first, all right. The question is, shall the house go under call? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 21 ayes, 2 nays, Mr. President, to go under call.

PRESIDENT: The house is under call. Will those in the Chamber please record your presence. Those not in the Chamber, please return to the Chamber and record your presence. Please look up to see if your light is on. Looking for Senator Lynch, Senator Baack, Senator McFarland, Senator Schimek, Senator Smith, thank you. Looking for Senator Lynch and Senator McFarland. Senator McFarland will be here momentarily. Senator McFarland is here and the question is, ladies and gentlemen, shall the agenda be overruled and a roll call vote has been requested in reverse order. Will you please hold the conversation down so the Clerk can hear your response. Thank you.

CLERK: (Roll call vote taken. See page 1814 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT: Senator Labedz.

SENATOR LABEDZ: Mr. President, changing from yes to not voting for purposes of reconsideration.

CLERK: Senator Labedz changing from yes to not voting. 27 ayes, 15 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to overrule the agenda.
