PRESIDENT: Question has been called, do I see five hands? I do. The question is, shall debate cease? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 1 nay to cease debate, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Debate has ceased. Senator Labedz, please.

SENATOR LABEDZ: Thank you, Mr. President. I suppose I could call this the last chance, certainly not the "Last Supper", although I just had a roll, but I will stand again and urge the senators to...at least two more senators to vote yes on overruling the Speaker's agenda. I will also need 30 on the next...am I right, Mr. Clerk, that I will also need 30 votes again to suspend the rules?

CLERK: Yes.

SENATOR LABEDZ: This is just to overrule the Speaker's agenda so that we can overrule the...I mean and put the suspension of the rules up with no further debates or amendment, and that comes up next.
