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yours, grant me the right to make mine, but whether you grant it or not, I am going to assert myself and do everything I can to make sure that my views are expressed. This motion that I have is to reconsider the vote we just took. The vote we just took was one, which if it stands,...

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...will overrule the Speaker's agenda and allow a motion to suspend the rules so that nine bills, two of which, in my opinion, are very pernicious, will be moved on one vote and I have got to say again, in this final minute of my opening, the difference between the motion the Speaker has made and this motion, even if you forget that one is on General and the other on Final, the Final Reading motion does not say pass all bills on Final Reading with one vote. His motion doesn't say that. This motion that you all will vote on is to say move all nine bills on one vote, but the key bill is the abortion bill, the antiabortion bill. That is the key bill. That is what the vote is being taken on and we know it. There is no other bill on that list in which Senator Labedz has enough interest to do the kind of lobbying that she acknowledges she has done.

PRESIDENT: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And she hasn't hidden it.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Labedz, followed by Senator Rod Johnson, and Senator Smith.

SENATOR LABEDZ: Senator Chambers, you are right. I have done all this this morning because of the abortion bill. I have been here 14 years and I have been doing it for the abortion bill and will continue to do it. And Senator Chambers needs 25 votes to reconsider. I am hoping that he does not receive the 25 votes and that we will go on to the next motion, which will also require 30 votes to advance the bills to Select File. Thank you.
