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were made to feel trapped and isolated. For nearly all women abortion is experienced not as an act of choice but as an act of despair, their only choice. This past week there was a conference of pro-life people here and we had a woman who came from California named Susan Carpenter McMillan. I happened to be able to speak with her. We visited out in the rotunda and we visited at the conference. She is heading a group called "Feminists for Choice" because she believes that abortion is a furtherance of the exploitation and use and manipulation of women by men.

SPEAKER BARRETT: One minute.

SENATOR McFARLAND: It was very interesting because she had never acknowledged publicly that she had been through an abortion. She believed that the cause was greater than...the issue was greater than any personal circumstances that she had been through, but one of the reporters, when she was here, asked her if she had had an abortion, and she acknowledged it. She said she had when she was in college, and she had went through that abortion process and she said afterwards she had regretted it, as many, many, many women say that they have regretted it after they have been through the process. And she said wouldn't it have been nice for me, I would have loved in retrospect to have had a statute or a law that would have required me to wait 24 hours, just reconsider what I was doing...

SPEAKER BARRETT: Time.

SENATOR McFARLAND: ...and have given me the information necessary to know what the consequences would have been because very likely she may have not went through the abortion that she has regretted all her life since then.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Langford. The question has been called. Do I see five hands? Do I see five hands? I do. Shall debate now cease? Those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Shall debate cease? Please record.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 2 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Debate ceases. Senator Chambers, would you like to close, please?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I would, Mr. Chairman, Mr. Speaker. I
