SENATOR CROSBY: I don't know that there is anything that would prevent that. But you have to have the number of votes, and on Select File that might not work, who knows.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But would you vote for it, would you give it your vote as you're giving it now?

SENATOR CROSBY: I will not say that I will or will not, because I think that when we get to Select File that's another set of circumstances.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But, if it's right to do it now, and the same circumstances of rightness exist then, you still would be unable to say that you'd vote right on Select as you're voting right on General.

SENATOR CROSBY: Well, you're using the word right, I mean I don't...see, I'm not sure that people talk about the right thing to do like eating oatmeal. Well, you can hang that on almost anything, right?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well,...

SENATOR CROSBY: Right, right?
