

Senator Goodrich. Senator Goodrich. Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, as I indicated earlier as we go along this afternoon I will indicate for your information the balance in effect that you have and still stay above a 3 percent statutory reserve. With the action on the previous one, if LB 1059 does not pass, there is 9.1 million through the current biennium, 13 million if you look through the biennium of estimated through the biennium ending June 30th of 1993. If 1059 is enacted over the veto, there would still be 3.7 million available this year or through this biennium and only 4.5 for the entire year. So there would, in effect, I want you to use your judgment but there is room for this particular override but again I caution you that at some point before very long in the afternoon that will no longer be true.
