SPEAKER BARRETT: The house is under call. Members, please return to your desks. Please check in. Those outside the Chamber, please return and record your presence. Senator Langford, please check in. Senator Labeledz. Senators Abboud, Scofield, Chambers. Senator Smith, Senator Robak. Senator McFarland. Senator Chambers, the house is under call. Roll call vote has been requested and the question is the Crosby-Baack motion. Mr. Clerk, proceed.

CLERK: (Roll call vote read. See page 2020 of the Legislative Journal.) 37 ayes, 8 nays, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BARRETT: The motion prevails. The veto is overridden. The next item, please. The call is raised. Please stay close.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next motion is by Senator Haberman with respect to the Legislative Council.
