

SENATOR COORDSEN: You heard Senator Warner. We had several discussions with the parties involved in the waning days of last week. It is a procedural matter. I would suggest that it is probably the cleanest to strike the language by overriding or reinstate the language by overriding the veto and that would make the project limit at whatever date in the future this was accomplished at \$1,900,000, but this does not add any money from the General Fund to this project. Thank you.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. The question is the adoption of the Coordsen motion referring to the veto of the UNL greenhouses. All in favor of that motion please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record, please.

CLERK: (Read record vote. See page 2027 of the Legislative Journal.) 35 ayes, 2 nays, Mr. President, on the override.

SPEAKER BARRETT: The motion is adopted. The matter is overridden. Next motion.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next motion I have is from Senator Morrissey. (Morrissey motion is on pages 2027-28 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Morrissey.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: Yes, thank you, Mr. Speaker, and members. I am moving to override the veto of \$80,000 I asked to be appropriated for a sales tax audit for the problem of border bleeding on the implement dealers in loss of sales. It is pretty tough to stand up here and argue for even a small amount like \$80,000 knowing some of the bills I am going to have to vote against later, but I will make my case and let you take a roll at it. Senator Moore compared me to Vard Johnson when I brought this and I don't know if that is a compliment or not, but I did state that I thought it was a little different than what Senator Coordsen said. It will cost eighty but it shouldn't cost us anything in the long run. We on the border areas know that we are losing a lot of farm equipment sales across the state line to the states that charge no sales tax. We are talking big ticket items, 70 to 100 thousand dollars, and everywhere in between and below that. It is a lot of money lost to the state in sales tax, a lot of money lost to the state in income tax because of the loss of those sales. The dealers lose those sales, the state loses the income tax, the dealer loses
