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his lumber yard and met some of his employees and that's an experience. (Laughter.) Frank came down here and sat on the Judiciary Committee for a couple years and there he earned the nickname, "Killer" Korshoj. We kept Senator Pirsch busy putting tombstones on his IPP motions on the bill books. But I'm going to tell you something, you always knew where Frank was at. Obviously, there was always one red light when we had a call of the house. And, Frank, some of the people here are going to miss your candy. Some of us that have a few extra pounds are not. Senator Moore is going to miss them. But I want to tell you it has been a pleasure for me to know you and to serve with you and I hope our friendship continues. Thank you for your help for all of us in being Frank Korshoj.

SENATOR KORSHOJ: Thank you. (Applause.) Well, I would like to do a little bragging now, myself, but not about myself. This is a great, great group of people. No, I'm not going to brag about the senators because you, individually, can do a better job of doing that than I can do it. But I will tell you the Sergeant-at-Arms, the Pages, and the staff of the senators, the LAs and AAs, and the Legislative Council staff are truly tremendous people and I'm going to miss them, I really am. They make it a pleasure to be around here. I have been kind of waiting for this day for...it will be short, tell me when it's 30 seconds, been waiting for this day for a long time and I got to thinking that when Bob Kerrey won the Senate race why he sang several choruses of Waltzing Matilda, didn't do a very good job of it. And I know some wise gazebo is going to holler, well, Frank, you're no Bob Kerrey; but, Bob Kerrey, you're no Frank Korshoj. Put that in your pipe and smoke it. So I told my aide, Barb, I was going to just sing four or five choruses of a song to get out here. I can't sing. And she said, no, make it one chorus only. So I will close with, Happy days are here again, the skies above are clear again, let us sing a song of cheer again, happy days are here again. And I'm planning on going into oblivion and I've got 48 hands pushing me to get me into oblivion. Thank you very much. Thank you, Jerry. (Applause.)
