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for clarification here. I think, Senator Lynch, I don't know how important it is or not, but when you were reading I believe you said, in that last sentence, you said, "after" instead of "before", and I think that you might want to make it clear, for the record at least. "Standing Committee amendment shall be considered by the Legislature after Appropriations Committee amendments, but before..." Yeah, you said after, and I think that...I don't know how important that will be, but it might be to someone to say, well, in the record it sa...you said after.

SENATOR LYNCH: Thank you.

SENATOR SMITH: All right.

SENATOR LYNCH: Thank you very much, Senator Smith. Very important, very important error on my part. I appreciate your catching that. So, in this case, like a lot of politicians, what I said and what I meant really don't...really didn't count there.

SPEAKER BAACK: Is there any further discussion? Senator Bernard-Stevens.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Senator Lynch, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR LYNCH: Yes.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Senator Lynch, I just want to clarify to myself. When the Standing Committee offers an amendment, as I read it, as Senator Smith clarified, it would be after the Appropriations Committee amendments, but before all other amendments. Can the Standing Committee offer amendments to the Appropriations, if they have not...if the chairman of the committee has not called a session of the committee to meet with the appropriate agency?

SENATOR LYNCH: So I can understand your question, I...

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Let's assume you don't meet with the agency, but the committee comes up and wants to make an amendment on the floor.

SENATOR LYNCH: Yes.
