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the Legislature as a whole. And you have to understand that under our...probably the only real change is...two real changes. One is that the present practice of agency review, which can happen at any time, will now be confined to after the Appropriations Committee has had its hearing, that's the one change. The second change, instead of having individual senators introducing amendments to the appropriations process, we'd also allow Standing Committee amendments to the appropriations process. And it's, once again, it's...if the wisdom of the body would be as to accept a Standing Committee amendment that you and I may not agree to be the best, you know, that would be our fault for not explaining our point of view better, I guess.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: One final question, Senator Moore, and then I will stop and won't put my light on further on this particular matter. You know, legislation is always a two-way street, everyone has an interest in appropriations, obviously, because we're dealing with money. On the other hand, everyone has interest in Judiciary, at times, because we're dealing with possibly death penalty, or something on that that affects all of us. Would you...court of appeals would be one, as Senator Kristensen pointed out. Would you also be favorable to another amendment, later on, on the new rules that we're going to have this year to say that Appropriations can offer an amendment to say a Judiciary bill, if we think that we need to do so, because of budget things that we've set, and we should be able to offer one to theirs without having any input, without having any hearings, and that would also be receiving priority status? Why a one-way street?

SENATOR WARNER: Senator Moore, do you yield?

SENATOR MOORE: Well, some would argue amendments are already offered in the form of the appropriations bills. So that already...As far as matters of policy, you know, I wouldn't mind that, but I don't see it as necessary.

SENATOR WARNER: Senator Bernard-Stevens. Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, question of Senator Lynch, please.

SENATOR WARNER: Senator Lynch, do you yield?
