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will be employed selectively, and I think for those reasons and for the reason that the existing rule is no rule at all in the hands of somebody who is absolutely set on killing a bill, for those reasons,...

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator, one minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...the system that we are proposing to you today, however modest, is a better rule.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Okay, thank you, Senator Beutler. Before I call on the next senator, I would like to read an announcement from Senator Carson Rogers. The Agriculture Committee will hold a meeting this morning under the north balcony at 11:15 a.m. for the purpose of electing a vice-chairman. Next we will have Senator Chambers, then Senator Hefner, Senator Ashford, Senator Pirsch. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam Chair, members of the Legislature, it would go without saying that I am opposed to this rule change as I always have been. Senator Beutler, it has been awhile since you were here but I want to ask a question. Wasn't there a point in the debate on some bill, I don't remember which it was, where you offered what might be described as a ton of amendments which would have required indefinite debate? Was there such an occasion, and I am not bringing up the issue because I don't even remember which one it was?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Oh, I think there were two or three such occasions, Senator Chambers. I used the rules as they exist as you do.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. It demonstrates that there come periods when every member of this Legislature at some point or other may find it necessary to have time to discuss an issue which others may not be of a mind to discuss. I remember LB 775, I was the one who carried what was called a filibuster. Yet because I was willing to keep us here and make us debate those issues, Senator Vard Johnson, who at that time was carrying water for the Governor, came over to me and asked me how did I want the bill discussed. And we reached an accord where we divided the bill into segments which before my attempt at this extended discussion was not going to be done. They knew they had the votes. Once a vote was taken, that bill was going to pass in the form that it had been introduced just about
