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amendment number four that is before us, I think the body needs to also, in light of all the debate, also take a minute and ask yourself a couple of questions. I was talking, for example, to Senator Moore and other people earlier in the debate and I asked the question, I said if this rule had been in effect last year, would it have made any difference on the process that took place unfortunately last year? And the answer, wholeheartedly or halfheartedly, but begrudgingly, at least, was no. It would have had no effect and the reason it would have had no effect is because the process worked well as far as how things were brought up, but the institution broke down a little bit because of the process on both sides. For example, twice the suspension motion came up to suspend the rules to cease debate and come to an immediate vote. Twice. It only required 30 votes, and in both occasions, there were not 30 votes. So you need to ask yourself, well, then if there were not 30, would there have been 33? I don't think so. Wouldn't have made any difference, but the one section of this particular rule that everyone is not even talking about is what happens towards, well, really any part of the session if you are on Select File. We are talking about an amendment that may be important or not, but the following amendment, there may be a technical amendment following that is relatively important to the bill to make it workable, needs to be done. The body gets angry or emotional for whatever reasons, passes cloture, goes to Final Reading. All other amendments that were pending, whether they were absolutely necessary or not, cannot be talked about. Automatically, we are done. Now what happens if there is a technical amendment that the bill has to have, for new members and old members, to remind us, we file a motion to send the bill back to Select File, back to Select File for a specific amendment. Okay, and if I read the amendment right, on amendment number four, that is a different stage of debate now. There is another eight hours, another eight hours that you would have before...that you could put amendments to the amendment, for example, on the rule that came...on the amendment that was going to be offered on Select File, another eight hours. Then you could do cloture, simply because we acted too quickly and you did not allow that which needed to be done to happen. And I guess what I am trying to say is for every emotional reaction we have to stop one thing in a democratic process, we also have to remember the effects of it. There are always effects elsewhere down the line and we have to be willing to accept those as well. Personally, this particular amendment makes it easier, to be quite honest. It makes it easier to delay.
