We talk about rural Nebraska, we want to help rural Nebraska, and we want to help the small towns, and here is a way that we can study it and be sure that we aren't snatching something away from them that they should have. So, I think what you need, eventually, as the committee studies it, if this is what happens today, is we need to know some...we need to see some statistics or how many students might be involved who still feel that they live in their own home town and come to school in the town where the college is, and then go back. And then those students who feel that, when they move into the town to go to school, that is their residence. So, there again, that will be a fine line. But I will support the motion to refer to the committee. Thank you.
