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cases, I don't know the exact percent, my Clerk estimated 30 to 40 percent are not employed by someone else. In other words, they are self-employed or in terms of have no other compensation. So it is a burden then on those perhaps undue beyond those that are employed. On the other hand, why should business pay for the cost of justice particularly in this country? So I submit to you \$40 is fair. I oppose the amendment.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. I will now recognize Senator Hefner, followed by Senators Dierks and Schmit. Senator Hefner.

SENATOR HEFNER: Madam President and members of the body, I believe I'm going to support this amendment. I believe it's more reasonable than the \$40 one. If I may, Madam President, I would like to ask Senator Wehrbein a question.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR HEFNER: Senator Wehrbein, in all cases, does the county pay for the jurors?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: As opposed to...?

SENATOR HEFNER: Well, I understand some cases where the person that loses the case will pick up all court costs. Is that included?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I can't answer that. I assume that's county. I don't know what the court costs...what's involved in court costs. I would defer to a former county attorney on that. They know the answer. I would think that's part of court costs.

SENATOR HEFNER: I don't know either but I believe, in some cases, I believe in some cases the person that loses the case would have to pay all court costs and that would include the cost of jurors.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I will let Senator Kristensen answer that. I think he has the answer, perhaps, Senator Hefner.

SENATOR HEFNER: Okay. Senator Kristensen, would you have the
