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many counties if they do provide that space, the telephone and so on goes with it, yes.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Thank you, Senator Kristensen. So, in essence, folks, if you are a court reporter and if you are doing court reporting on the side, the office is furnished, the equipment is furnished, the phone is furnished, there is no cost to your doing this business. This is being picked up by the taxpayer. I also understand, Senator Kristensen, didn't you say that the salaries run from 30 to 40 thousand dollars?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: No, Senator Haberman, you didn't hear me, it was from 22 to 30.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Twenty-two to 30, so everything that the court reporter picked up, if they were getting \$30,000, would be the 30,000 plus, is that correct?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Well, in terms of gross but not for net.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Do you have any idea of what some of the court reporters are grossing in the State of Nebraska?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: No.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Do you feel that this information would...might be interesting?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: No.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Well, then you are...oh, I see, okay. Well, I think it would be interesting as I would like to see just exactly what we are doing here, how much we are increasing the income of the court reporters. I understand that a judge does pick a court reporter and, usually, the court reporter stays with this judge, period, is that correct, Senator Kristensen? If that is not correct, Senator Kristensen, correct me.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: I am not sure. You say stays with him, period.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Well, a judge will pick a court reporter and this court reporter becomes his court reporter, and he travels with him, and is more or less under his wing, so to speak.
