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liable, but he would still only be liable for his portion, is that correct?

SENATOR ASHFORD: He'd be liable for his portion, a defendant who is 10 percent and then you have a nonasset defendant, too. Is that what you're asking?

SENATOR ROBINSON: Yeah, yeah.

SENATOR ASHFORD: Well, a 10 percent defendant, under my bill, if there is a defendant that has no assets, could be liable for more than 10 percent. But everybody equally shares in the apportionment, including the plaintiff.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Of course, you could turn that around, too, and the first person you go after could be 90 percent liable. Right? He could be 90 percent liable, they couldn't get any money on him, out of him, then you'd go back to the formula, then the other two...

SPEAKER BAACK: Time.

SENATOR ROBINSON: ...and the plaintiff would have to...that liability would be distributed between those three people. Is that correct?

SENATOR ASHFORD: Right, you distribute the liability pursuant to their percentage of fault, that's correct.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Thank you.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Robinson. Proceeding down the list we have Senator Ashford.

SENATOR ASHFORD: Am I next? I would call the question, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BAACK: Do I see five hands? I do. All those in favor of ceasing debate vote aye, opposed vote no. Senator Abboud.

SENATOR ABBOUD: Mr. President, I'd request a call of the house.

SPEAKER BAACK: We have a request for a call of the house. All those in favor of the house going under call vote aye, opposed vote nay. Record, Mr. Clerk.
