What do we tell these kids in the classrooms, Senator Hefner, do what you think is right; do what you think is proper, then we come here as a Legislature and say we know what is proper but we are not going to do it because of the possibility of not going to a bowl game. The young people listen to us talk all of this bull about morality and what is right. Then when time comes for us to give an example by our actions, we back off because of financial considerations. That is why they have so much contempt for things that we say. We can't practice what we preach. We, when we were younger, were better people than we are now because we believed in doing what is right. But now Senator Hefner will let the words come out of his mouth that if we pass this bill, it puts the university in a position of having to follow our laws. When have they not had to follow all of our laws? That is why we pass them, Senator Hefner, because the university's practices are out of step with what is just and fair and proper. I don't think people need to be discriminated against themselves to understand how hellish it is to have that happen, and discrimination occurs, Senator Hefner, when you are situated exactly as everybody else is who is being given a benefit but you are told that you are not going to get it, and in every other respect, you qualify. At least, I don't think you have to have been discriminated against to understand that. I see little piddling things that happen around here to various legislators and it drives them up the wall, and they say that it is unfair to them, but when we talk about a whole category of students, we cannot understand or we pretend not to be able to understand how wrong it is to allow this type of discrimination. I would like the bill to pass with the emergency clause, but what we would like to have and what actually occurs are two different things. In the present form of the bill, nothing will happen as far as the bill taking effect until June, the first, of 1992, and even after that date, nothing happens.
