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the first class. I think that was within municipalities. Give me a second here.

SENATOR WARNER: No, it's first class.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: I think that has to do with stagnant water and...

SENATOR WARNER: That's what I was trying to make certain that...

SENATOR MORRISSEY: That was my interpretation, Senator.

SENATOR WARNER: ...provisions are limited to within the city limits.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: Yes. The two-mile limitation is the first class cities dealing with stagnant water or any other nuisance accumulating thereon, as it says in the bill. It says...and when you go on to address the weeds and litter, it says ground within the city.

SENATOR WARNER: Thank you.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Warner. Further discussion, Senator Bernard-Stevens.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Senator Morrissey, would you yield to a couple of questions?

SENATOR MORRISSEY: Yes.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Okay, now on these cities that, obviously, they don't seem to be able to get their people to do it on their own so they're asking the state to give them a hammer to force the people to do so, I assume what they'll do is they'll take a little measuring stick and they'll figure whether it's 12 inches or not. And, of course, if it's above that, go through what would be the process then after they decide that it is 12 1/2 inches, that they want to now remove it, what process will they do in order to get the person to actually pay the penalty?

SENATOR MORRISSEY: After the city, you know, first of all, the city may do this if they want or not.
