

ourselves find that an agency, through intent, through error, through misunderstanding, through carelessness has written some regulations all or part of which do not reflect the intent of the Legislature or perhaps the content of enacted legislation, we come back in and introduce another bill. Now, those are the unnecessary bills, those are the unnecessary bills, those bills that we have to introduce to change an error in rule or regulation. This bill is basically permissive upon the part of the committee. If it's not postponed, Senator Beutler has some further clarifying amendments that he would like to offer to LB 22. I would suggest to you that Senator Landis is correct, we could, in fact, ask to be put on the mailing list. We could meet as committees and review the proposed regulations. We could, in fact, write a letter or provide oral testimony at the hearing, but we don't do it. Hopefully, this small effort to provide a simple, easily understandable system for the free flow of information between the state agencies and the body of the Legislature would help us to avoid uncounted numbers of bills to correct errors in the future. So, I have to stand to oppose the postponement motion, and would like to move to Senator Beutler's amendment.
